Local Tasmanian trainees and Rural Medical Generalists talk about why they are committed to rural communities and their experiences.

Mr Ben Dodds – Ben is a 5th year medical student at the University of Tasmania, Rural Clinical School. Ben is current Vice Chair of the National Rural Health Student Network and Past President of his local Rural Health Club Rustica. Ben has an interest in Rural Generalist Medicine and



is part of the Tasmanian Rural Medical Generalist Coordinating Council, an alliance creating Tasmania's own Rural Medical Generalist Pathways. Ben hopes to work within the areas of Emergency Medicine, General Practice and Health Administration



Dr Lisa Searle – Lisa grew up in rural Tasmania and completed medical school at the University of Tasmania. During her degree she did electives in a very remote part of Thailand, and in the Philippines, as well as rural placements in St Marys (Tasmania) and Broken Hill. Following medical school she started to get involved with the Peter Hewitt Care for Africa

Foundation and did a couple of trips to work in a small remote hospital in Tanzania and Kenya. For many years she has been very interested in working with refugees and in 2009 joined Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors Without Borders), with whom she has completed a number of missions and is planning another one this year. Lisa loves the outdoors including rock climbing and bush walking, and is also an active environmental campaigner and activist. She is currently working as a GP registrar and hoping to gain her fellowship in 2017. Lisa lives and works in the Huon Valley and cannot see herself going back to urban life anytime soon!



Dr Darren Briggs – Darren entered post-graduate medicine and explored many areas of Australia before more recently living and working on the North West Coast of Tasmania. He is a GP Registrar at Smithton, and also works as a CMO at the North West Regional Hospital and Mersey Community Hospital.

Dr Elizabeth (Lizzie) Elliott – MBBS, FRACGP, DipDHM Lizzie grew up and studied in Northern Queensland. Her love for travel and adventure lead her to Tasmania in her intern year where she began seeking out remote Medical Officer positions in the Arctic and Antarctic. Her job has taken her to such places as the

Greenlandic ice sheet with climate scientists, to an Arts festival in the Solomons, to the Southern Ocean en route to Macquarie Island, and scientific diving medical support in Antarctica. She is currently completing a GP Anaesthetics qualification in Hobart, and has recently embarked on her most challenging role yet, as a parent.
